



Nouveau Chrono

In style that is contemporary yet elegant, the Apiana Chronograph from Milus (now available in the United States) boasts a dynamic composition, with four lateral stainless steel segments (both brushed and polished) that are hand-mounted to the case. This timepiece features a white mother-of-pearl dial with boldly converging anthracite numerals composed in the Art Nouveau style and a black Galuchat strap to embrace the wrist. The Apiana Chronograph features an automatic chronograph movement with a date aperture positioned within the loop of the 6 o'clock marker. Retail price: \$5,700.

Western Wear

Designed in the United States, this Schofield timepiece by Bozeman Watch Company is both rugged and refined, as it is "suitable for a rodeo or the symphony," according to this Montana-based firm. The 44.5 mm stainless steel case is composed with classic appeal, and it surrounds a simple white dial with Roman numerals positioned at the quarter hours. The Schofield timepiece is powered by an automatic COSC-certified chronometer with date. A black or tan crocodile strap fastens Bozeman's Schofield to the wrist. This collection is limited to twenty-five individually numbered pieces. Retail price: \$5,700.



Skeleton Phoenix

Watchmaker Michel Jordi has reintroduced the Valjoux 23 Squelette movement in his Single Phoenix timepiece. This movement, a favorite within the independent horological community, has been fairly rare since 1974. The Phoenix by Michel Jordi alludes to the mythical bird that symbolizes rebirth. Constructed with a 43 mm rose gold case, the illustrious manual-winding movement is intricately skeletonized and engraved by master goldsmiths and jewelers, and is visible through the sapphire crystal atop the case. The many hands are accented in blue and red, a smart contrast to the sophistication of the skeletonized dial. Retail price: \$49,800.
